

Why Study Religion?

Understanding Humanity's Pursuit of the Divine

Terry C. Muck

This brief primer explains why Christian students should study religion, how they should go about it, and why it is important in our contemporary, pluralistic context. Terry Muck, who has been a scholar of religion for over thirty-five years, introduces the discipline and explains how the study of religion can be approached by Christian students. He explores the contemporary significance of studying religion in a complex, multicultural world, which requires engaged Christians to develop an understanding of other religions and religious movements along with their adherents. Muck concludes by addressing the skills and perspectives students must bring to the study of religion in the twenty-first century.

Why Study Religion? explores how committed Christians can be excellent "objective" students of religion, active and accepted in the academic guilds of religious studies scholarship without shortchanging their own deeply held religious beliefs. Written in accessible prose suitable for undergraduates, it can be used to supplement any standard religion textbook in an introductory religion course.

We in no way offer this book as a comprehensive analysis of the evangelical rediscovery of biblical justice. Our goal is simply to introduce the reader to a small but vital selection of key figures and seminal organizations that propelled the movement forward. . . . Nevertheless, we believe that readers from any faith tradition (or none at all) who seek a critical, nuanced introduction to post-World War II evangelical activism will find just that in the pages that follow.

The heart of our motivation for writing this book lies in the future, not the past. We write as actors in an unfolding script. In our roles as pastors, professors, activists, and servants, we have learned much from the previous two generations of evangelical leaders. In fact, it would not be too much to say that our lives have been shaped by them. Our desire is not only that those who read this book will encounter solid academic history but also that the people and events of the past will help to form the next generation. We have observed that oftentimes zealous believers with the best intentions rush in to fight the world's worst injustices; unfortunately, they often wind up harming as much as helping. What is often lacking is simply the patience (and sometimes the humility) to first listen. In essence, this book is an opportunity to hear the voices of those who have gone before us so that we can adopt their strengths and avoid their struggles.



Soong-Chan Rah (DMin, Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary; ThD candidate, Duke University) is Milton B. Engebretson Associate Professor of Church Growth and Evangelism at North Park Theological Seminary. He is a sought-after speaker and a major voice on today's evangelical social justice scene. Rah is the author of Many Colors: Cultural Intelligence for a Changing Church and the influential The Next Evangelicalism. He was founding pastor of Cambridge Community Fellowship Church, a multiethnic, urban, postmodern generation church in Cambridge, Massachusetts. He serves on the boards of Sojourners, the Christian Community Development Association (CCDA), World Vision, and the Catalyst Leadership Center.



It is so beautiful, this description of the Trinity. And I would stake my life on it. Indeed I have, and I will.


But what happened to me is that this dynamic came close to home. Too close.

It took nearly twenty years. But God is persistent. As the psalmist has it: "like a moth you eat away all that is dear to us" (39:12). He took Susan away from me.
