That's What Little Boys Are Made Of


Genesis 1-2

But a while later Adam slumped on the ground. "What's the matter, Adam?" God asked.






"I'm bored," Adam said with a sigh.



Adam's breath caught in his throat. "That's from the tree God said not to eat from, Eve. He said if we even so much as touch it we'll die."






Adam recognized the fruit because he often wondered why God didn't want him to touch it. Eve had broken the only rule God gave them.
